At the City Council Meeting on October 4, Marion was presented with a certificate of recognition for her 29 years of volunteer work at the Police Department. Emergency Preparedness Exercise

City of Paso Robles staff recently participated in a week-long Emergency Preparedness Exercise at the FEMA Emergency Management Institute (EMI) in Emmitsburg, Maryland. Brian Cowen and Susan DeCarli from the Community Development department, Dave LaCaro from Public Works, and Lynda Plescia from Recreation Services, along with a total of 75 other local stakeholders, were invited by the City of Atascadero to participate in the exercise, which was funded by a FEMA grant.

The exercise included classroom discussions, facilitated by a number of subject-matter experts, and a presentation from Union Pacific, reviewing response and recovery efforts relating to the June 3, 2016 Union Pacific Derailment near Mosier, Oregon, in which a total of 16 tank cars derailed, spilling Bakken Crude adjacent to the Columbia River. The capstone of the exercise was an all-day simulated emergency, in which the City of Atascadero Emergency Operations Center (EOC) was activated in response to the derailment of a Union Pacific train, transporting crude oil, adjacent to Atascadero State Hospital.

The exercise challenged participants to remain calm in the midst of a developing emergency and highlighted the importance of working together to coordinate and document the wide range of operational, logistics, and planning considerations that accompany response to and recovery from an emergency. Takeaways included an appreciation for just how connected we are on the Central Coast and how dependent upon one another we become in the event of an emergency.

The City of Paso Robles is grateful to FEMA and the City of Atascadero for the opportunity to participate in this outstanding emergency preparedness exercise.



Fall Water Conservation Update

This summer the City’s water customers continued conserving and maintained water use well below the state-mandated 2013 use target—we used approximately 50 million gallons fewer this September than in September of 2013.

Overall, City customers have continued to be responsive to conservation requirements including changes to the City’s watering schedule. The majority of water conservation reports and observations throughout town have resulted from broken or leaking irrigation systems. However, there have been some persisting non-compliance issues. The City’s water conservation staff continues to provide outreach and notifications to water customers to alert them of irrigation system issues and to help them comply with the current watering schedule.

Participation in the City’s rebates programs has remained high, and 61% of the 16/17 fiscal year rebate budget has been issued or is committed to active projects.

The City’s combined water conservation efforts have resulted in the City saving nearly 1 billion gallons of water since June 2015.



Leaves Press Release

With the change in season and wet weather quickly approaching, residents are reminded to collect and properly dispose of the leaves from trees on their private property and the sidewalk bordering their property. Leaves left in the street can clog our storm drains, resulting in street flooding when it rains. To prevent potential flooding issues in your neighborhood, residents are encouraged to collect and dispose of yard waste in the green waste bins for collection on regularly scheduled waste collection days. City crews will provide cleanup of leaves associated with City street trees. Please keep in mind the following items:

- ◆ Blowing or raking private property leaves into the street (gutter or storm drain) does not constitute proper cleanup or disposal.
- ◆ If possible, mow over your leaves to create mulch. This will greatly reduce the amount of fallen leaves to cleanup and your lawn will love it!
- ◆ Residents that have yard service are asked to remind landscaping service companies and yard care providers that leaves must be placed in the green waste bin.



Annual Community Event to be Held at Centennial Park Thursday, November 24



Thanksgiving for Paso Robles will once again host a free Thanksgiving dinner for the community on Thursday, November 24 from 12 to 2 p m in the banquet room at Centennial Park. The traditional sit down dinner event, now in its 32nd year, is made possible solely from the support of community donations and volunteers.

Each year the Recreation Services lobby, banquet room and kitchen are transformed into a large restaurant for a single day. Chef Ryan Messina will serve as the lead chef for the event this year. In addition to the sit down dinner, volunteers deliver meals to those who are homebound.

“Thanksgiving for Paso Robles is a true expression of our community, bringing diverse people together to share the day with one another,” said Dave Kudija, Director of the Thanksgiving for Paso Robles steering committee. “Whether people come because of financial considerations or just the desire to be with others on this day, all are welcome. It’s a lot of work but it has been fulfilling to see so many work together to serve the Paso Robles community.”

Monetary donations and volunteers are crucial to this large event. The funds for the annual dinner are raised solely from private donations from individuals, churches, students, and businesses.

Thanksgiving for Paso Robles is now accepting monetary donations. Over 250 volunteers are also needed to assist with activities including set-up, food preparation, serving, delivery, and clean-up. Volunteers are required to sign-up ahead of time and are scheduled for specific tasks prior to Thanksgiving.

Thanksgiving for Paso Robles began in 1984 when Mildred Wilkins organized an event to feed families and those in need. Over the years the number of dinner guests has increased significantly from about 90 guests each year to over 1,000 people served in 2015.

Youth Commission Meets and Sets Yearly Goals

Established in 1999, by then Mayor Frank Mecham, the Paso Robles Youth Commission serves as a formal advisory body to the Paso Robles City Council and is comprised of twelve high school students (three of whom are alternates).

On Wednesday, October 5, the Youth Commissioners met with City Council, School Board and City representatives to discuss and set their yearly goals. The group agreed that the goals they'd like to work to achieve this year include performing community service, attending a conference, supporting team-building and advocating for teen issues in the community. This final goal will be accomplished through the regular attendance and participation of Youth Commissioners at City Council meetings and voluntary attendance at School Board meetings throughout the school year.

During the October meeting, the students also had the opportunity to meet with and discuss current plans for the Paso Robles High School with new principal Mr. Eric Martinez. Martinez shared his personal goals for the high school with the group and talked about his past experience as a school administrator at Sanger and Fresno Unified School Districts.

"The Youth Commission is a strong and positive voice of teens in our community," said Lynda Plescia, Recreation Services Manager. "Commissioners bring forth issues, work on a variety of community service projects, offer the Recreation division ideas for youth programs in Paso Robles and do advocacy work. In the process, they learn a great deal about how city government works."

especially if you're planning on giving handmade presents this season. Paso Robles Recre-




October 5. Or make a bohemian crocheted bracelet featuring freshwater pearls and Czech glass beads with Bohdi on November 2.



City Council Highlights - October 4, 2016

Volunteer Recognition –

Acknowledged Marion McKie for her 29 years of volunteer service to the Paso Robles Police Department. Over those years, Marion's service would total over 11,000 hours of community contribution. Thank you Marion!

Streets to be Slurry Sealed –

Approved a construction contract with Souza Engineering Contracting Inc. to crack fill and slurry seal multiple road surfaces throughout the City. The slurry seal will occur on 19 separate stretches of mainly residential roads, with the intention to extend their useful life and improve their drivability for residents. Marijuana Regulations – 2nd Reading of Ordinance –

Approved 2nd reading of an ordinance that would amend local regulations for personal, medical and commercial use of marijuana in response to the potential passage of Prop 64 on the November Ballot. The ordinance would continue to allow medical marijuana delivery services within the City limits.

Airport Commission – 1st Reading of Ordinance –

Took the first step in forming a new Airport Commission that would assist the Council in the long term development plans, policies, practices and standards for the municipal airport. The Council also provided direction on a set of draft bylaws that will establish the Commission's makeup of stakeholders, at-large citizens, residency requirements and the specific purview of the Commission's responsibilities. The City Council is scheduled to consider a revised version of the bylaws at their meeting of October 18, 2016.


Oak Tree Removal Request –

Referred the oak tree removal request back to City staff to obtain additional analysis of the 44-inch Valley Oak's structural integrity before making a decision to allow removal of the tree. The tree is located on a vacant portion of the former Hometown Nursery site located at 1803 Spring Street.


